Pangkor Marina in nocturnal lights

The first of a two-part series covering the two-week 2014 voyage to Phuket, one of Aseanarean Bluewater Alliance's signature cruises.

The much awaited annual cruise to Phuket had arrived! Familiar faces greeted us at the pier when we arrived at the marina. Six boats – Lady Olivia, Leeway III, La Gaeta, Volare, Joey and Dolphin – had gathered in anticipation of the two-week trip. A couple of our friends had departed in the wee hours of Saturday morning for recreational time with their friends and families before meeting us at Puteri Harbour.
